"In the city we (are) called upon to be attentive to and responsible for everything. We (are) supposed to be interested, and to some extent involved, in changing fashions, aid to India, professional football, tax schedules, the meaning behind what politicians said...the yelp and whine of the newest, most sensational pop singer (et cetera). This city world lacks time in which to discover what was important, much less to live. ...By contrast, the 'cottage' was a haven and a tower of vantage." (Excerpt from Of Time and An Island, John Keats, 1974)

We recently had the privilege of visiting two of our earliest area cottages; both lovingly cared for by their current keepers. First, we met Jack Hartman and Peter Gamber at the Contrary Club on the shores of Little Cranberry Lake, and later we met Frankie Mathias on Hewitt Island. During our visit Ms. Mathias loaned us John Keats' wonderful book (*see quote above*), as a way of explaining how she feels about her relationship to her island. Both interviews provided fascinating glimpses into days gone by in the Seeley's Bay area, and caused some reflection upon how some of us may be losing touch with the very best our community has to offer, i.e. refuge from a too-busy urban life. Many of us who are permanent residents have filled up our lives here with the chores and demands required by mod cons (noisy lawnmowers, giant TVs, over-powered boats, etc.). Whereas wisely, some of our tourist 'pioneers' still cherish the more peaceful and simple aspects of Seeley's Bay life.

The Contrary Club was created in 1926 by 12 men from Pennsylvania when they were looking for a place to relax and drink, during Prohibition. They arrived in Seeley's Bay in 3 Model T Fords. quite by chance, and stayed at the Coleman Hotel where they were catered to 'in the best of fashion'. The very next day, with the help of the local captain of police, they decided to buy Leadbeater's The following summer they returned and built their club Point. house, which is essentially unchanged in its simplicity to this day. Mr. Hartman, who is the long serving Mayor of the Borough of Cleona, shared their guest log book which records 85 consecutive years of visits, all of which reveal ever-changing fashions, jargon, and social preferences, while also hinting at the tough realities they were leaving behind for a short holiday, including wars, gas rationing, and the many political changes that occurred over almost a century of club existence. The end of Prohibition saw a bit more emphasis on fishing at the Club. During one era the members had an annual 'Shit Fishing Tournament', where they blasted off competitors with Roman Candles and gave them two hours to catch

1 crappie, 1 perch and a rock bass; great hilarity ensued. Today's members practice catch and release conservation fishing, and consider Seeley's Bay "the prettiest place in the world".

The first holiday cabin on Hewitt Island pre-dates the Contrary Club. In about 1908, Frankie Mathias' grandfather purchased land from a local farmer (there were 3 nearby farms on the Frontenac side all of which delivered milk to the cheese factory in Seeley's Bay via the man-made cause way and hand ferry from Hewitt Island). William Henry Hewitt had been visiting his wife's relatives (proprietors of the Metcalfe Hotel) and tried fishing at Haskin's Point, where, he reported, the fish basically jumped into his creel. The local people paid little attention to the recreational opportunities then...no one had boats or time for leisure; village life was focused in 'town' at the base of the bay, and the Point was simply a place where cows drank water. But Mr. Hewitt saw the potential and built a summer home on his new 'half an island'. Frankie has early memories of hitching a ride into the village via the ferry with the farmers, and as she got a bit older, rowing over on her own. Due to illness Frankie's father moved the family permanently to Seeley's Bay during the war years, and he practiced medicine at the back of what became known as The Lodge, which Frankie's mom turned into a first class tourist home. Frankie can recall how during the war years the women of the village faced new challenges as they learned to get things done without the men.

Today we know The Lodge as the Seeley's Bay Retirement Home, but the interior layout is still familiar to Frankie who regularly visits life-long friends in 'the bay'. It takes a bit longer to get to the village since the ferry was shut down, but Frankie still uses her boat, or drives around. Seasonal outings to Jones Falls for lunch at the Hotel Kenney, the moon rising across the Bay, picking up deadfall under the island's trees, and watching for the Kawartha Voyageur to come by, are all just part of the lovely annual rhythm of her island.
