



SBARA steps up!

It's been a pretty special year for SBARA. We are delighted and honoured that our *Steps Up* program was recognized in the categories of Design, Community Building and Economic Development by the Rideau Corridor Recognition Awards Program.

Steps Up is a 'multi-faceted revitalization plan intended to help sustain and support local businesses, and to improve the overall quality of life for all area residents'. Since 2011, SBARA has focused on improving and developing community infrastructure and facilities and promoting the village and local businesses, as well as providing advocacy and support for local concerns - the village dock and park, the #KeepSweets campaign and more.

Moving into 2018, SBARA continues to advocate for investment in the local community, making recommendation to TLTI. Plans include repairs and improvements to the Vita Parcours fitness trail; ongoing partnerships with other village volunteer groups to support events and services; continued efforts to connect local businesses through www.visitseeleysbay.ca and liaison with tourism and economic development partners in the Rideau and 1000 Islands; fundraising for future goals and village enhancements; welcoming new residents; and engaging new volunteers and Board members.

The strategic plan for the next five years, including *Steps Up - Phase 3*, is 95% complete. However, to be complete, it needs your thoughts and ideas. Commitment to food security

As R.O.L.L. Aid approaches its 20th anniversary in January, it continues to lead the way in supporting those in need in the Township.



Building on the emergency response to the 1998 Ice Storm, local resident and teacher Donna Robinson became the driving force behind the first rural foodbank in the area. There are now five, but it is still the only one that makes deliveries, “crucial to reaching people in the hinterland”, says Donna.

For Donna, Administrator until 2016 and Director until Spring 2017, her involvement has been “extremely rewarding”. But this is a good moment to step back (if not totally out of the picture), both for her own wellbeing and because she can see a healthy renewal of volunteers. For this year’s well-supported food drive, there were 75 or so canvassers, a mix of regulars and newbies. For the first time though, none had taken part every year.

Donna’s hope is that the organization will continue to branch out and be more than a foodbank - it currently administers a crisis intervention fund and links with other initiatives, including school cooking programs.

Donna also says that she’d “like folks to look for the need in the community and make contact with the R.O.L.L. Aid Centre if they become aware of food insecurity issues.”

The R.O.L.L. Aid Centre is open on Tuesdays, 10 - 12, at the Seeley’s Bay Royal Canadian Legion Branch

Volunteering - community for the future

Early in October, local MP Gord Brown and MPP Steve Clarke awarded 152 Canada 150 medals to Leeds-Grenville volunteers and community builders who ‘take the extra step to ensure that the rest of us can live better lives’.

Volunteerism is a major thread in Canada’s cultural fabric, with 12.7 million volunteers contributing close to 2 billion hours annually. There is a shift, though, from more traditional volunteer activities to a variety of forms of social engagement.

Volunteering can be about helping to create community, about ‘paying it forward’, about making a difference. Not necessarily a major commitment, it can be as simple as a small act of kindness like shovelling a driveway or picking up groceries for a neighbour.

But what is it that motivates someone to volunteer?

Canada’s 150 for 150’s definition of volunteering states that ‘people who choose to spend their time with others as their focus do receive a return. These personal returns include enhanced compassion, sense of self, health, skills, experience, and impact to name a few’.

I asked some of our local award winners why they do what they do.

SBARA director and former chair Peggy Sweet McCumber noted that,

to some extent it came from her parents; because they contributed so does she. ‘But I also enjoy it,’ she said. ‘I enjoy meeting people through events and I love to organize’.



As well as meeting people, Danny Roantree enjoys ‘planning something, working hard - there’s such a feeling of achievement, which is good for self-esteem.’ Danny has an involvement spanning decades with local events like Frost Fest and Canada Day, when, like a Pied Piper, he leads the children’s parade.

For Karen Simpson, another event stalwart, it’s about her kids and grandkids. ‘I want to make this a good place for them to grow up, to make them want to stay’, she said.
