Russell Thompson and Muriel Knapp split their time between Florida, their home on Haskin's Point Road and the cottage on Dog Lake.

Russ is a warm and engaging man who has made a great contribution to Seeley's Bay, by founding a good business, by his involvement in the Legion and the Masonic Lodge, and through countless other acts of good citizenship.

Later this month Russ is off to Holland with his son Steve, grandson Jason and Jason's wife Michelle. This will be Russ's third return visit to commemorate the liberation of Holland by the Canadians. Russ was part of that liberation, when as the Dutch say "freedom was regained so we could speak, listen, go, feel free, stand, unite and gather because there was no curfew and the shortages problems were soon solved."

Russ's grandparents had Loyalist roots in the Napanee area but his dad went west and worked as a blacksmith in Dauphin, Manitoba on the railway line to Churchill. Russ learned his electrical trade from his brothers in Manitoba. When he came east to help out his wife's family with their fishing lodge business, he began to do electrical work for cottagers around the lake. Eventually he got a big contract with a home manufacturer in Portland, and wired hundreds of pre-fabricated homes. Within a few years he had five men working for him.

Today, Thompson Electric is a very well-known and respected firm, made stronger still by the leadership of Russ's son Earl, and now Jason. The firm specializes in major commercial projects, and currently provides 50 good jobs to families in Seeley's Bay and beyond.

This new column will regularly provide a little insight into the history of the Seeley's Bay area. Most of you will know Dan Roantree, a retired educator, Leeds and Thousand Islands Township "Citizen of the Year" in 2009, United Church organist, school bus driver, and local history guru.

Why Is There A Tepee In The Park?

In about 1825 Justus and Ann Seeley moved onto lot four in the eighth concession of Leeds, which is the land on the north side of Mill Street and circles around the bay. When the Seeleys arrived there was no bay of course because the Rideau Canal had not yet been built so just a stream was running through marshland. Local lore suggests that after the Seeleys established themselves on their land they built a structure resembling a Native tepee from which they ran a trading post or store doing business with the local natives and white settlers. The bay and the village are named after the Seeleys. When Canada celebrated its 100th birthday in 1967, a new park was established along Haskins Point Road and is still called the Seeley's Bay Centennial Park. At that time a group of local citizens formed a Centennial Committee to plan special events for the community, and they decided to build a large tepee in the new park to replicate the tepee from which Justus and Ann Seeley did business140 years earlier. In it was placed the epitome of modernity, a colour television set – hence the motto of the local celebration - "Tepee to TV".



Hardware Store Revival
